


I grew up in what can only be called a multi-cultural house in Cambridge, Mass. My father was a trainer for the Peace Corps, and we had a stream of beautiful Nigerian men living with us (that provided my sister and me our first crushes). My dad was involved with the Urban League and had ties to the Black Panther Party. My parents' friends, during their marriage, were a multi-racial group that included a few

mixed-race couples, not a common thing in the early 70's. After my parents' divorce, my mother's circle was mainly Black. This is not to explain away my racism; it's just to paint the backdrop.

When we moved to Old Lyme, I think one Black family lived here. There was no diversity. No Jews, either. While I'm not religious and don't attend synagogue, when I asked where it was, my realtor said there was a "summer" one for the beach neighborhoods. This frightened me because I KNOW, first-hand, that ignorance breeds discrimination.

There were a few Black kids in my daughter's school, only one multi-racial child in her grade all through elementary. When she got to high school, a historic New England boarding school, I was thrilled to find a diverse student body. Finally. Lots of Black girls and Asian girls. Her roommate was from India by way of Hong Kong. I badgered her constantly to make friends with the Black girls. PLEASE have a Black girlfriend. It became a running joke between us. But her tight group was just like her. And then I saw it. In the dining hall, the Black girls had their tables, the Asians their corner, and the White girls clumped together, too. It had never occurred to me that the Black girls did not WANT to be friends with my daughter. I had never, for one second, thought of myself as racist until that moment.



We've all sat mired in terror and discomfort this week as the world descended into chaos. Friday afternoon, I eavesdropped on a Zoom meeting at my daughter's company. Her Black and Brown colleagues were given this platform to relate their experiences at work and in life. It was excruciating, very emotional, and painful to hear. I applaud her company for providing a safe space and wonder how many businesses have done the same this week. She and I took a deep dive over the weekend into the resources provided by her Diversity and Inclusion Committee. I've included some below in the hopes that knowledge and understanding will help stitch together our deeply divided country.




A Guide to Outdoor Dining During the Pandemic




Ocean House and Weekapaug Inn **Reopen June 16**
